Letter from The New Honorary Colonel

Greetings,

I am honored to be selected to serve as the Honorary Colonel for the Bataan Battalion Alumni Organization (BBAO). I was commissioned in 1987 and the Bataan Battalion provided me with the tools to succeed as an officer in the United States Army. Being part of the BBAO now affords me the opportunity to give back to the Battalion and University that provided me the tools to be an effective leader of Soldiers.

I was a young Specialist 4th Class in the New Mexico Army National Guard when I decided to pursue my commission through AROTC. Upon my graduation and commissioning, I attended the Air Defense Artillery Officer Basic Course, at Fort Bliss Texas. During this time, I decided to compete for a three year active duty position with the intent to fulfill my three year obligation on active duty and return to the New Mexico Army National Guard with the a better understanding of how the active force runs. Three years turned into 32 and I culminated my career as the Commanding General of White Sands Missile Range and retired in 2018.

I knew I wanted to give back to NMSU but was unsure in what capacity. A great opportunity arose and I was hired as the Deputy Director of the Physical Science Laboratory (PSL) in October 2019. In June of 2020, I assumed

the role of Director of PSL. As a leader on the NMSU campus, I have the opportunity to interface with many key decision makers within the university. This allows me to advocate for the ROTC programs and potentially provide opportunities for further collaboration with key stake holders on campus.

I want to thank Gary Cataldo and Jack Fox for having the faith and confidence in my ability to fill this vital position and look forward to working with the Bataan Battalion Alumni to continue supporting this great program that has done so much for all of us.

LTC Adam Buchanan and his staff are doing great things and he's provided a strategic vision for the battalion to ensure future success. We have an opportunity to support their efforts as alumni and enhance the small but effective battalion staff/cadre.

The Ranger Challenge is the Army ROTC's competition event that has been going on for over 35 years. The Ranger Challenge is made up of nine graded events that test the Cadet's mental and physical toughness, technical and tactical expertise while building teamwork and individual leadership skills.

At the start of the fall semester, the NMSU Army ROTC hosted tryouts for the Cadets that consisted of a Ruck March, Combat Water Survival test, Army Combat Fitness Test, and multiple team-building tasks. There are ten slots in the team and only the Cadets that meet or go above the standards continue to compete with the team.

This year, the Ranger Challenge was hosted by the University of Arizona and conducted at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. After nearly 100 days of training, the cadets completed two grueling days of different events. They persevered through rigorous events like the ACFT, Ruck March, Basic Rifle Marksmanship, Obstacle course, and various basic and leadership tasks. The emotional well-being of Cadets was tested while pushing themselves to their limits.

At the end of the Ranger Challenge, NMSU Army ROTC placed 7th out of 10, beating out their rival, UTEP. Our team placed first in the call for fire event. The participating cadets learned valuable lessons in managing a training plan and teamwork. Go Bastards!

In late October 2022, our program hosted a Field Training Exercise with the UTEP ROTC program. We conducted our training at Camp of the Tall Pines near Cloudcroft, New Mexico at an elevation of 7,000 feet. This training environment provided our cadets with intensely rugged, and forested terrain. Our field training exercise tested our cadets on a wide variety of tactical skills from land navigation to squad tactics. This was a joint training event with UTEP which required our cadets to adapt and work with cadets from another program.

> Our tactics lanes stretched from 400m-800m in length, with many of the movements to their objectives over mountainous and rocky terrain. Cadets were tested in their skills as squad leader and team leader positions in preparation for Advanced Camp.

> Culminating their training exercise, cadets held a patching ceremony for our newly welcomed contracted cadets! They then enjoyed a catered BBQ meal from a local vendor, which was a huge morale boost for all cadets participating. Not only was it fun but they gained immeasurable leadership and tactical experience which will help mold them into successful leaders.

Honoring Those Who Came Before

Staff Sergeant Miyamura earned his Medal of Honor during the Korean War. He was a machine gun squad leader when a particularly brutal attack from the enemy threatened his entire squad. Knowing his soldiers were wounded and tired, then-Corporal Miyamura ordered them to retreat while he provided defense and cover. With a machine gun and bayonet, he eliminated 50 enemy soldiers before his capture. Once repatriated, Miyamura received his Medal of Honor and was promoted to Sergeant. Hiroshi Miyamura died in Phoenix, Arizona, on November 29th, 2022 at the age of 97.

The NMSU Army ROTC program was honored to receive the call to attend the funeral and dedication ceremony for Staff Sergeant Miyamura by the JROTC program instructor at Miyamura High School in Gallup, New Mexico. Both cadre and cadets were on the cannon crew for his gun salute.
